Course Description	This course is designed to introduce students to the key principles of American law and is a survey of the first-year J.D. curriculum at U.S. law schools. The course provides a basic overview of the U.S. legal system, then focuses on basic foundational subjects: constitutional law, civil procedure, contracts, torts, property, and criminal law,		
	each in separate topics.		
Course Objectives	At the conclusion of the course, you will be able to do the following: 1. Evaluate and understand the purposes and key elements of various sources of law in the United States (constitutional, statutory, regulatory, and case law); 2. Evaluate and understand legal authority structures, identify legal issues, and assess source credibility and accuracy; 3. Apply U.S. legal materials to problems related to U.S. constitutional and common law; 4. Use sound methods of legal research relating to U.S. law; 5. Evaluate, orally and in writing, complex U.S. legal issues; and 6. Engage with faculty and fellow students in the case method of instruction.
